Your task is to compile a brilliant portfolio of rhetorical and grammatical devices using the following guidelines:

- 1. Select a source that you believe is rich in rhetorical devices and grammatical constructions. Some possibilities: the pages of a particular magazine, the work of a favorite author, the lyrics of a beloved songwriter, or the speeches of a political figure. Once you pick your source, you must stick with it.
- 2. Once you have selected your source, find an example of **each** of the following:

active voice	alliteration	anadiplosis
anaphora	anastrophe	antimetabole
antithesis	aposiopesis	apostrophe
appositive	assonance	asyndeton
chiasmus	epistrophe	euphemism
figurative language	gerund	hyperbole
imperative sentence	infinitive	litotes

passive voice	periodic sentence	personification
understatement	polysyndeton	rhetorical question

- 3. Next, decide how you will present your findings. Your goal is to create a unified, attractive portfolio that includes all of your examples, a table of contents and "pretty stuff" to please your audience.
- 4. Each page (or whatever) must include the term, the definition, an accurate quote from your source, a brief caption that explains how your example exemplifies the rhetorical device, and a citation.

You may find quotes from your source that demonstrate more than one rhetorical term or grammatical construction. For instance, you might find one quote that demonstrates both hyperbole and participle. You will need to explain how each rhetorical device is exemplified in your example.

You get up to 2 wild cards. I'll explain that in class.

This project is worth 110 points. Neatness and creativity count. Your due date is Wednesday, December 19.
