1. a coordinating conjunction (fanboys)

I love dogs, but I own a goat.

- 2. correlative conjunctions (either/or, neither/nor, not only/but also) **Either I need to buy a new car, or I need to get a chauffer.**
- 3. semicolon

Vampires fly; werewolves howl.

4. conjunctive adverb preceded by a semicolon

The rules are clear; nonetheless, I choose not to follow them.
