20% Project Homework for the Weekend

Follow these directions precisely:

- 1. Get a clean sheet of blank paper, standard printer size or larger.
- 2. Grab a pack of colored pencils or markers.
- 3. In the center of the page, write down a topic that truly interests you. (The topic might be a word, "baking" or "lacrosse" or it might be a phrase or sentence, "I want to learn to speak and write Russian.")
- 4. Draw a cloud or circle around your topic.
- 5. Brainstorm ideas that relate to your topic. Use different colors, lines, and shapes to categorize your ideas. Create subtopics or subcategories.
- 6. Include questions in your brainstorming? "How do I write a novel?" "Do I start with characters?" "Should I know the ending first?"
- 7. Fill your paper even if it takes all weekend. Start a new sheet if you get irritated or think of a new topic.
- 8. By the end of the weekend, write a paragraph about what you might pursue for your project. Include a research-based question, a possible final product, and some steps you might take. You may use the format below if you wish. *This assignment does not constitute a contract. You will be given more guidance next week and time to change your mind.*

Examples

Questions:

How difficult would it be to learn ballroom dancing?

How much bird imagery does Shakespeare use in his plays and why does he use it?

Products:

I will produce a step-by-step video of how to learn the tango. The video will include a final performance that includes a costume.

I will produce an extensive portfolio that includes information about each of Shakespeare's birds both in their habitats and in his plays.

Steps:

- I will contact local dance experts and conduct interviews.
- I will research dance steps on YouTube.
- I will use Twitter to connect with dance troupes around the world.
- I will research the history of classic dances.

It's okay to fail the project, but it's not okay to fail to produce.1
