

1. Notes for Wednesday, October 17, 2012 – Write these notes into your grammar spiral.

Participle = a verb form used as an adjective

Present participle = verb + ing Ex. The pouring rain
("Pouring" describes the noun, "rain.")

Past participle = verb + -ed or -d Ex. A peeled and sliced cucumber
("Peeled" and "sliced" describe the noun, "cucumber.")

2. In your grammar book, under your notes for "Participles Used as Adjective," create sentences using the following participles as adjectives: **running, accepting, leaping, hidden, challenged, missing, scorched, hitting, written, devised.**

Ex. Locked / The locked gate kept the zombies out.

3. Identifying participles and the words they modify. Underline each participle used as an adjective and draw an arrow to the noun or pronoun that it modifies. **Remember that participles used as adjectives describe a noun or a pronoun nearby.**

Ex. We thought the banging shutter upstairs was someone walking in the attic.
