**DON'T:** In the book, it is quoted: "Making a short deft movement, Tom Buchanan broke her nose with his open hand" (Fitzgerald, 37).

**DO:** Tom Buchanan's brutal nature comes to the surface after a disagreement with his lover: "Making a short deft movement, Tom Buchanan broke her nose with his open hand" (Fitzgerald 37).

**DON'T:** In *The Great Gatsby*, Tom Buchanan says, "it's up to us who are the dominant race to watch out or these other races will have control of things" (Fitzgerald 13). This quote shows that Tom is a racist.

**DO:** Tom Buchanan, the blue blooded rival of the intrepid Jay Gatsby represents the quintessential privileged, white male in America who believes "it's up to us who are the dominant race to watch out or these other races will have control of things" (Fitzgerald 13).

### **How do I incorporate quotations from my outside sources?**

**The first time that you mention a source, you should introduce it.**

In his September 2017 *New Yorker* article, "Is Ending DACA the Worst Decision Trump Has Made," William Finnegan sheds light on just how significant the impact of DACA protections are when he cited a recent survey of DACA immigrants showing that "ninety-one per cent were employed, and forty-five per cent were enrolled in classes."

**If you use your outside source again, you do not have to re-introduce the article.**

Stirring up panic by insisting that immigrants are rapists and murderers is "a tactic drawn straight from the nativist-demagogue playbook" (Finnegan).

### **Other Examples**

Nick almost inherently realizes that Wolfsheimer's "gonnegtions" are of questionable origin (Fitzgerald 71).
